EMPLOYMENT/VOLUNETEER OPPORTUNITIES



<u>Seasonal DWP Laborer</u> – The Town of Avon is accepting applications for seasonal laborers. Duties may include parks and grounds keeping, roadside maintenance and maintenance/repair of town buildings. Seasonal DPW workers will work under the general direction of the DPW Director. Physical effort is required for this position including standing, lifting, bending and walking on uneven surfaces. This position is considered by the Town of Avon to be a seasonal position in that such employment will be limited to no more than the specific period and will not be extended beyond that point. Seasonal employees are not entitled to any unemployment benefits. This is a non-benefitted, non-union position that carries a starting pay range of \$16.49 to \$17.32 per hour. Meet Kathleen Waldron - Town Health Agent






