

Setting: The extensive Avon Sole Company buildings, presently being demolished, are located immediately across the rail line from the former station. Industrial buildings are also located northeast and southeast of the building. A residential area is located along East High Street west of the station.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

The building is located on the west side of the active MBTA line on a narrow lot bounded by East Spring Street and East High Street. The lot is paved with gravel and asphalt. Vegetation lines the west lot line.

The 2-story, coursed ashlar building is sited parallel with the rail line and is capped with a gable roof with deep eaves and exposed rafters. A brick chimney with a corbeled cap is centered on the roof ridge. The west elevation contains three doors and two rectangular windows at the first story. The center doorway remains operational; the other two have been infilled with panels containing window-sized single lights. The second story contains two rectangular windows and a smaller, square sash window. The north and south gable-end elevations are two-over-three bays deep with a round-arch window opening in the gable peaks. The door and window lintels, sills, and thresholds are constructed of cut stone. Windows throughout the building are 1/1 metal sash. Set into the stonework are square nailing blocks onto which the shelter was originally attached. A 1-story, shed-roof ell attached to the north elevation is constructed of concrete block. The ell contains two garage bays with overhead metal doors in the west elevation. A gable-roof concrete block ell attached to the south elevation contains a single garage bay with an overhead metal door in the south elevation.

The station building's stone construction appears to be uncommon among Old Colony Railroad Stations. More research is recommended.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

The railroad station building was constructed circa 1889. In 1888, when Avon separated from Stoughton to become its own municipality, this location along the Old Colony Railroad was still part of the town of Holbrook. The new Avon town government believed it essential to have access to a rail line in order to promote business. On April 16, 1889, Avon successfully petitioned the Massachusetts legislature to annex a small portion of Holbrook - the portion that contained the existing railroad station. The existing station was constructed that same year, replacing an earlier station building on the site.¹ The Old Colony Railroad was absorbed into the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company in 1915. The railroad sold the property in 1952 and service was discontinued.² The building was owned by Avon Coal & Oil from 1960 until 1985.³ The property is currently occupied by Cycle Performance Auto Body, a motorcycle repair shop.
