ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

Located on a level lot, the house is oriented to the east, toward the street. The lot is covered with lawn around the house with scattered mature trees around the property boundaries. An asphalt-paved driveway leads past the south elevation. The frame house rests on a cut stone foundation and rises one story to a side-gabled roof with a shallow overhang at the façade and no overhang at the side elevations. A brick chimney is centered on the roof ridge. The symmetrical 5-bay façade contains a paneled wood door at center that is accessed via three brick steps. The wood surround contains half-height sidelights and fluted pilasters beneath a molded frieze. The side elevations are two bays deep. The gable peaks each contain a pair of windows. The house has been expanded over time with a shed dormer on the rear roof slope and a small 1½-story rear ell. An enclosed porch fills the ell's south elevation. Windows throughout the house are vinyl sash with internal faux muntins.

The house's 1-story, 5x2-bay form is a common building form used during the mid-late 18th and early 19th centuries. Interior inspections were beyond the scope of this survey, but a closer examination of surviving framing, floorplans, and interior features and finishes by an architectural historian with expertise in early Massachusetts building technology could provide additional insights into a likely original construction date and on the physical evolution of the building over time.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

577 West Main Street was likely constructed circa 1828, the year in which John Porter purchased 20 acres of land at the southwest corner of West Main Street and South Street (known as the "town road" and the "county road" at the time). Farmer John Porter (1801-1873)² and his wife, Mehitable B. Kingman Porter (1807-1889),³ had been married the previous year. John Porter's parents, Captain Robert and Elizabeth Porter, lived a short distance north of this location, on the west side of West Main Street north of South Street. The house was later owned by John and Mehitable's son, Benjamin W. Porter (1835-1911),⁴ then by Benjamin Porter's son Albert L. Porter, and then by his wife, Mary B. (Lynch) Porter.⁵ The house was sold out the family in 1931. The house was owned by the Nillson (later, Nelson) family from 1931 until 1992.6

The building's appearance suggests an 18th-century construction date, especially when compared with its neighbor at 607 West Main Street (See AVO.2.) While the 1828 deed does not mention the presence of a dwelling house, it may have existed at that time. More research is recommended.
