WINTER SAFETY TIPS FROM DPW

•Patience, please – During a snowstorm, a team of 8 DPW workers and up to 6 contractors are out working. Plowing arterial roads, roads that connect to high-traffic areas, Emergency response units, public safety facilities, schools, and town buildings is Public Works' top priority, so please be patient when waiting for roads to be clear.

•A passable road does not mean a completely clear road – Remember, in the initial stages and during a snowstorm, crews work hard to make roads passable, not completely clear. Always drive for conditions (monitor speed, leave earlier than normal and leave extra space — at least 250 feet — between yourself and plow trucks.)

•Monitor weather conditions. If you don't have to go out, Don't – Of the many factors people should evaluate before heading out into snowy weather, the impact of wind on visibility should be considered. High winds along with snow accumulation affect a vehicle's ability to move through the snow as well as visibility, and people must take into consideration these factors before making the choice to go out in the snow.

PROTECT YOUR HOME AND PIPES

Pipes and utility meters can freeze when the temperature remains below 25 degrees for extended periods of time. The following tips will help protect water lines during periods of cold weather.

- Wrap exposed faucets and pipes, including those outside the house or in unheated crawl spaces, attics, garages, and other areas. Be extra alert if you have had frozen pipes in the past.
- Let a thin stream of cold water run from a basement faucet, or allow faucets to slightly drip in Kitchen, etc. The stream or drip should be a continuous flow, no more than the size of lead in a pencil. This water can be caught in a bucket and used later.
- Open cabinets below sinks to allow the heat to circulate around the water pipes.
- If your interior pipe is frozen, warm it with hot air from a blow dryer or heat gun where it enters your house.
- Be sure you know the location of the water shutoff valve in your home. Check and maintain it periodically to ensure it works properly.
- Cover any vents around your home's foundation.
- Be sure to shut off water to outside faucets.
- Monitor your sump pump. A frozen drainpipe could result in a flooded basement.
- Invest in a snow shovel and/or a snowblower and use it to keep driveways and pathways clear for emergencies.
- Make sure storm drains remain clear of debris and are not blocked by cars, garbage cans, or accumulated snow.

PROTECT PEOPLE

Keep warm and stay inside, if possible, when temperatures see extreme lows. If you need to go out, dress in layers and wear hats, gloves, and an appropriate coat and shoes.


- If driving, be sure you have traction devices, your smart phone, some drinking water and nonperishable snacks in case you get stuck and must wait for help.
- Avoid overexertion, as cold weather puts added strain on your body.
- Observe heater safety: never place a space heater on top of furniture or near water; keep heat sources at least three feet away from furniture and curtains.
- Never leave children unattended near a space heater.
- Protect yourself from carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning by installing a battery-operated CO detector and never using generators, grills, camp stoves, or similar devices indoors.

SNOWPLOW SAFETY

The Town of Avon prioritizes plowing and road treatment on the highest-use streets that accommodate the most drivers, major employment areas, schools, and transit routes. We ask the community to drive cautiously, safely and do not follow closely behind nor pass the snowplows.

SNOWBANKS

 Minimize potential for snowbanks in front of your driveway. To do so, clear a wide apron in front and to the right of your driveway or walkway (when facing your property from the street). This allows snow that the plow has accumulated to drop off before it reaches your driveway.



Do not let children play in snowbanks near roads!

• Encourage children to play and build their "snow forts" in the back/front yard or on private property and NOT in the right-of-way snow/ice banks. Plows cannot always see children!

PARKING SAFETY

- Whenever possible, park your vehicle in a safe location and off the street during snowstorms. Street
 parking impedes snowplows and makes roadways narrower, sometimes impassable for emergency
 vehicles.
- If your vehicle is buried in the right-of-way and cannot be moved, please make every attempt to periodically clear off built up snow. Pile snow away from the right-of-way and as far back from storm drains. Plows cannot always judge a vehicle vs. a large snowbank. Please do your part in removing vehicles that may be in the way of the plows.
- Please remove outdoor basketball hoops, hockey nets, etc. from roadways before a snowstorm.
