2024 DOG LICENSING

Thank you to the dog owners who have already registered their four legged friends, to date we have licensed 174! All dogs must be licensed by May 31st each year or be subject to a **fine** of \$25.

Ways to license your dog:

- 1. Mail Mail in the Dog license renewal that was included with your 2024 Annual Street Listing/Census. Renewal forms can also be found on the town website.
- 2. Process your dog license online https://unipaygold.unibank.com/customerinfo.aspx

Save time- tags and license will be mailed to you! Online registration is available for dogs that have a current rabies certificate on file. There is a small processing fee for this online service.

Dog Licensing Fee is \$10 for neutered or spayed dogs

\$15 for male or female dogs

2024 CENSUS

REMINDER: The Annual Census forms must be signed and returned to the Town Clerk's office. Census forms need to be returned even when no changes are necessary. Community-Wide Historic Properties Survey

This project involved the first professional community-wide historic resource survey of significant historical and architectural resources located in the town of Avon. The goal is to build a comprehensive survey that encompasses all buildings over 50 years of age. This project identified historic resources that meet the criteria for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places. This survey also provides recommendations for future survey efforts.

The work built upon the survey of 12 houses undertaken by Avon history community volunteers in 1978 and 1980. These 12 forms included only brief building descriptions and the cursory historical information lacks source documentation.

This survey includes 112 primary buildings. Form B - Building inventory forms were prepared for 83 primary buildings and 18 outbuildings. Form A - Area inventory forms were prepared for 4 areas, which included 29 primary buildings, 3 outbuildings, and 1 monument. Updated survey forms were created for the 10 surviving buildings from the 1978-1980 survey. A National Register of Historic Places context was identified around Shoe and Boot Manufacturing during the Early Industrial Period (1830-1870). 6. What is the next place on your bucket list?


a. I've been to a lot of places, but the next place on my travel bucket list is Maui, Hawaii. I've wanted to see the island for a while now.

Vote By Mail Application Postcards: On or around January 20th, all registered voters received a Vote by Mail application postcard mailed to them directly from the Secretary of the Commonwealth's office. The postcard will allow you to choose a ballot for March's Presidential Primary, September's State Primary, November's Presidential Election, or all elections in 2024, which would include Avon's Annual Town Election.

The first batch of Vote by Mail Ballots were mailed the last week in January. Once you receive your ballot, please mark your vote promptly, place the ballot in the manila ballot envelope and sign the required affidavit on the envelope. Place the sealed ballot envelope in the postage paid white return envelope and return by U.S. mail or place in the secure drop box at the Town Hall at 65 East Main St. You can also track your application and ballot at



HAPPY BIRTHDAY AVON!

This land that we call Avon was originally sold to the English by Chief Chickataubut in 1630 and was known as the "new grant". This became part of the town of Dorchester. Moses Curtis decided to move his family from Braintree to this area in 1720. He built the first house here in Dorchester. The house still exists today at 21 North Main Street. Dorchester's south precinct became part of the town of Stoughton in 1726. Known as Curtis Corners by 1740 due to several Curtis houses in the area. The area then becomes the village of East Stoughton. The town of Avon was established on February 21, 1888 by an act of the state legislature. What do you love about Avon?

Avon is a unique town, because it has or had at some point in time, all of the following:

- *An amusement park
- *A zoo
- *An outdoor theatre
- *A regional baseball stadium
- *A drive-in movie theatre
- *Several buildings that were built in other towns but never moved



BULK COLLECTION DAY - SATURDAY FEBRUARY 10, 2024

A limit of five (5) items may be placed out for each bulk collection.

BULK Example: a table and four chairs would be five items.

COLLECTION Items may not be placed out earlier than one week prior to the collection.

POLICY Trash totes and bags of trash will not be picked up. Cardboard will not be picked up.

Mattress and box springs are no longer collected at bulk collection. See below.

The Compost Site is located at 90 Wales Avenue. Open on Saturdays from 9AM-2PM. Identification must be shown. All tickets must be purchased beforehand at the Avon Town Hall, 65 East Main Street, Avon MA 02322. For more information, please visit www.avon-ma.gov. Grass Clippings Leaves, Brush	Less than 6" diameter	No Fee
Electronics	Fax machines, stereos, radio equipment, propane tanks, cable attachments, e-book readers, scanners, wire, speakers, metal (nonferrous), cell phones, telephone, tablets, printers, keyboard, computer mice, telecommunications equipment, VCR/DVD players, space heaters, servers, copiers, cameras, modems.	No Fee
Electronics	TV's, computers, monitors, laptops, microwaves, air conditioners (no commercial units)	\$10.00 Fee
Appliances	Refrigerators (must have doors removed), stove, dishwasher, washers, dryers, humidifiers, dehumidifiers, water heaters	\$32.00 Fee for Disposal at Composite Site (Free for quarterly bulk collection)
Mercury Containing Items	Fluorescent lights, mercury items (thermometers, thermostats, batteries)	No Fee
Cardboard	Any cardboard must be flattened	No Fee
Batteries	Most single-use household batteries (AAA, AA, C, D and 9 volt), alkaline batteries, batteries that contain NO mercury (Can be disposed of in the weekly trash collection)	No Fee
Furniture	Couches, dressers, chairs, and other small items	\$32.00 Fee for Disposal at Composite Site (Free for quarterly bulk collection)
Mattresses and Box Springs	Acceptable: Twin, double, queen, king, California king; traditional mattresses box springs constructed of metal, textiles, wood, and foam. Crib mattresses and memory foam mattresses.	If unacceptable and cannot be recycled, there is a fee of \$60 to dispose of each item.
	<u>Unacceptable</u> : Excessively torn, punctured, soiled or moldy items. Twisted or crushed mattresses or broken box springs. Wet or frozen mattresses or box springs. Mattresses or box springs infested with bed bugs or other pests. Futons, fold-out sofa beds. Mattress pads and toppers. Infant sleeping pads; air or water beds; any other furniture or textiles.	
Textiles – SHOULD NOT BE PLACED IN MUNICIPAL TRASH	Tops, jeans, sweats, socks, coats, shoes, purses, belts, blankets, sheets, towels, stuffed animals, draperies, pillows	Accepted at collection bins located at the Compost Site, Butler Elementary School and AMHS. No fee
